## Student Funding Opportunities

- The **Holger Hansen Graduate Student Fellowship** (for incoming students) honors our program's founding Director. Under his leadership the program addressed the important demand of Connecticut and the region for population health curriculum and services. The Hansen Fellowship provides a tuition waiver and academic stipend to support a student under the mentorship of program faculty. Typical awards are for one year, although exceptional students may receive a continuation award for a second year of support.
- The **Segal Scholarship** (for incoming students) recognizes 40+ years of service to UConn by our program's founding Associate Director, Joan Segal. The Scholarship awards tuition support (\$1,500 –3,000) to an entering student who would otherwise lack financial support necessary to begin their graduate education.

- The **MPH Program Fund** (for incoming and current students) provides a number of small awards (\$500-\$1,000) each semester for students who are pursuing activities related to professional development (e.g., conference registration/travel, organizational membership, etc.).
- The **Lewis/Schensul Fund for Global Health** (for current students) recognizes the commitment and passion for global public health by program professors Judy Lewis and Stephen L. Schensul. The fund provides medical and public health students with financial support to participate in research and educational experiences in underserved communities, domestically or internationally.
- The MPH program provides employment as **Course Assistants** (for current students) to as many as 10 individuals each semester who function as assistants to the instructors of our undergraduate and foundational public health courses. Students selected for these roles earn \$5,000 per course, per semester.
